

REMEMBERING 9/11

9 SEPTEMBER 2001—A LIFE CHANGING EVENT

Andrew Wallace shared about the global and personal impact of the 9/11 attack on the World Trade Centre. After eighteen years the memories from that day still affect and touch the lives of many.

Andrew stepped up as a volunteer fire fighter to assist and support the New York fire crews during that terrible time. His new crew forged a strong and lifelong bond in a short time. One of his fellow NY fireman had lost his brother during the search and rescue effort. His family was presented with a metal cross made from the debris from the collapsed Towers. Only 343 of these crosses were made and distributed. On Andrew's return to WA, his new friend gave him this cross as a reminder of their deep and meaningful bond and a symbol of their gratitude for his selfless efforts. Students had the opportunity to hold a piece of history in their hands.

It was an inspirational morning with many valuable life lessons. Andrew encouraged the students to have a positive mindset, find the passion within themselves and to never give up. He demonstrated how hard work not only earns you respect from your peers, but also self respect. Thank you, Andrew for sharing your experience with us and being an example of determination and passion.






