





Life cycles in action

Our learning in science this term has explored life cycles. This has included considering both plant and animals' lifecycles and how they rely on each other. To illustrate the relationship between flowers and bees, students in room 11 first created enticing flowers, then became honey bees and cross pollinated these flowers. We discovered that the flowers with the brightest colours and most symmetrical patterns attracted the most visitors.

This was a very engaging task and provided rich and meaningful discussion about which flowers would have successfully been fertilized, what relationship exists between animals and flowers and how the various parts of flowers contribute to the production of fruits and seeds.

A taste of applied science

Finding creative solutions for environmental problems

During Science Week, the Year 5 and 6 students learned more about the problem of pollution. They brainstormed innovative new solutions to some of the problems we see in our oceans the most common polluted item being plastic. Students created edible water bottles (no single-use plastic bottles required!) using sodium alginate and calcium chloride. There were mixed reactions to the strange texture of biting into a slimey bubble full of water!

It was a fantastic activity that allowed students to consider possible alternatives to using plastic.





The Year 8s build their knowledge

The Year 8 students have been building models to learn how atoms can be arranged from molecules to crystal lattices. They thoroughly enjoyed the experience and showed a great level of understanding.







The Year 9s have chemistry

The year 9 students have had an exciting start to their chemistry topic and have been learning about acids and bases. The students made a chemical indicator from red cabbage leaves (a substance that changes colour in acids and bases) and tested different substances like lemon juice, lemonade and antacid tablets.

How to get a Student SmartRider

To make obtaining a student SmartRider card as easy as possible for students, parents and schools are able to order student SmartRiders online. (https://www.monitorwa.com.au/SmartRider/default.aspx) You'll get the student fare for any journey Monday – Friday during the school year and concession fares on the weekend and during the Christmas school holidays.

There are two ways to get a Student SmartRider. You can use a manual application form or place an online order. The initial card is free if you use the manual application form.

Ordering with application form


Complete an App<mark>lication for Student SmartR</mark>ider form, have it autho<mark>ris</mark>ed by the school administration, and mail it to the address shown on the form.

Ordering online

The system takes you through a step by step user-friendly process. Simply select Atlantis Beach Baptist College, fill out the form and the card gets posted to the school. The college will act as the ID verifier and give the card to students.

Picking up a card in person

Once you have a completed Application for Student SmartRider form you can also head to Monitor WA to purchase a Student SmartRider. The SmartRider will cost \$5 (cheque or cash only) and no value can be added by Monitor WA. Monitor WA is open Monday to Friday from 9.30am until 3.00pm and located at Unit 2, 17 Macadam Place Balcatta.
